A distant cousin of Lorcán's (Howard Flannery) had a young family in Ennis. One of the kids was diagnosed with Cystic Fibrosis and the couple had to traipse back and forth across the country to Dublin every weekend to take the child for treatment for many months. Many others along the west coast were in the same boat. Exhausted by this rigmarole, Howard kick-started a fundraiser to build medical treatment facilities in Clare. He persuaded all his friends and neighbours to get out for sponsored walks and runs, and they formed the Clare Crusaders. The running club transformed the health and fitness of its members and funded a medical centre which opened in 2007 at a cost of €250k with no state funding.

Tragically, Howard was killed on his bicycle on 03/06/2007 whilst training for a tri-athlon when a motorist fell asleep at the wheel. The family were devastated, and his only brother (Gordon Flannery) who lives in Listowel formed the Kerry Crusaders in 2009. The running club is hugely popular in Kerry and raises funds for a wide range of children with special needs, including medical equipment and educational hardware. Lorcán turns out for the Dublin marathon in the company of dozens of crusaders wearing the bright yellow tops of the Kerry Crusaders and the bright orange tops of the Clare Crusaders. They get fit at least once a year and help kids in need.

Wells of Life

Wells of Life Ireland works in tandem with the U.S.-based organization that has funded and drilled 385 water wells serving approximately 385,000 in remote villages throughout Uganda. At a total cost of €5000 (overhead costs are covered by the organization), 100% of donations fund each well providing clean water to 1000 villagers for up to 25 years.





Focus Ireland was founded by Sr. Stanislaus Kennedy as a result of the finding of research into the needs of women experiencing homelessness in Dublin.

Sr. Stan was involved in a research project into the lives of women experiencing homelessness in Dublin, when she realised the importance of involving people, who are, or have been directly affected by homelessness, in the development of homelessness services.

In 1985, two years after the initial research Focus Point (now Focus Ireland) opened its doors in Eustace Street, Dublin. The organisation provided streetwork services to young people, advice, advocacy, information and help with finding a home as well as a warm welcoming place to meet and have a low-cost meal.

Since its foundation Focus Ireland has continued to grow and its research and advocacy work ensures that the rights of people who are homeless remain on the political agenda. In addition to its Dublin projects, it now has services and housing projects across Ireland including in Waterford, Kilkenny, Cork, Sligo and Limerick.



Each year the walk provides an opportunity for people to connect with their local community and to show their support for those who have been impacted by suicide. Our team of dedicated volunteers, in Ireland and overseas, return year on year to make the event a success and to help us all continue to raise awareness in the global fight against suicide and self-harm.

Since Darkness Into Light began, our supporters have helped us raise almost €29 million, which has enabled us to keep our doors and our 24/7 helpline open for people in crisis, free of charge. In 2012, our first international event took place in London, and since then our international partner charities, from Seoul to Spain and New Zealand to the Netherlands, have benefited from an investment of over €3.5 million in local mental health support services.



The **BCI Research Centre** is located within the Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland, Dublin, and has 14 full-time scientists, researchers and postgraduate medical students employed. The Centre provides a world-class research environment with access to cutting-edge facilities and practices the very best in 'bench-to-bedside' translational research with high impact international publications.



St. Francis Hospice provides a specialist palliative care service to people in North Dublin. This includes support for their families and friends and all healthcare professionals involved in their care.

The service is based on a Christian philosophy of human dignity, which treats each person with respect and compassion, irrespective of their cultural or religious background or socio-economic status.

The hospice plays a leadership role in shaping palliative care nationally, working in partnership to advance policy, education, research and service innovation.
